OPERATOR: Now, that's not in the job. I'm just going by what I know. It says Nora 95 Broadway/Nassau. That's how we got it. We got it from our stations department. The female aided is in front of the booth.

CRO: Okay. What's the CN number? I've got it. Okay. Wait a minute.

OPERATOR: The CN number is 102861.

CRO: Okay. My job number on this one is 788, 788. You can cross-reference it in case they cross-reference it with the job number of the Trade Center. Trade Center number of the job is 727.

OPERATOR: 727?

CRO: Yeah.

OPERATOR: That's the Trade Center job.

CRO: Right.

OPERATOR: Okay.

CRO: Okay, AC?

OPERATOR: Okay.

CRO: Thanks a lot.

OPERATOR: All right. Thank you.

CRO: Bye-bye.

CRO: Caller, this is EMS. Is the patient breathing?

CRO: Okay. Hold on. We'll verify the location. I have it as 250 Hudson near Spring Street; is that correct?

CRO: And what's wrong with her?

CRO: She's having difficulty breathing?

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. She's not asthma or anything; it's just excited; right?

CALLER:

CRO: Anxiety; right?

CALLER:

CRO: I want you to take a deep breath at the location. I want you to calm down. An ambulance will be there as soon as possible. Are you near that building?

CALLER:

CRO: How far are you?

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. You're at a safe distance right now. You are safe; correct?

CALLER:

CRO: There's no fire in the building?

CRO: There's nothing -- okay. I want you to take a breather. Everyone is there. Everybody is on their way. They're there. Everybody's helping there.

CALLER:

CRO: Okay? Have her calm down. The only thing I can tell you to do is because of the accident and what's happening, you're going to have to take some first aid instructions. Make sure you don't give her anything to eat, to drink. Relax. Tell her to loosen any tight clothing. Put on something like music, anything to calm anybody down. An ambulance will be there as soon as possible.

CALLER:

CRO: 250 Hudson Street with Spring Street on the cross. Is there a floor?

CALLER:

OPERATOR: 11th floor.

CALLER:

CRO: Ma'am, what's your last name?

CALLER:

OPERATOR: RO, I need a job number, please.

CRO: My job number is 969. I need your job number too, AC.

OPERATOR: We're not entering jobs.

CRO: You're not entering jobs?

OPERATOR: No.

CRO: Let me get a call back.

OPERATOR: The call back there is (212) –[identifying information redacted]

CRO: Go ahead.

OPERATOR: [identifying information redacted] And your job number, I'm sorry?

CRO: My job number is 969.

CRO (to caller): Ma'am --

OPERATOR: 969.

CRO: -- everybody is on their way. We're all working hard to try to get this on; okay?

CRO: Yeah.

OPERATOR: I'm just going to put it in.

CRO: All right.

OPERATOR: One World Trade Center. Okay.

CRO: I need more than one slip.

OPERATOR: Okay. I can't believe this. It's got to be -- it's got to be hell.

CRO: This call from the 22nd floor, I'm just going to put that back in. Or is it a different location?

OPERATOR: He didn't give the exact location.

CRO: He didn't?

OPERATOR: He said it's on the side of the building. The plane blew up on the side of the building and it blew the building up. Do you want the ANI-ALI information?

CRO: Yeah.

OPERATOR: It's--I'll have to spell his name. Are you ready?

CRO: Oh, yeah, go ahead.

OPERATOR: The last name is [identifying information redacted] First name is [identifying information redacted] Yeah, I'm back up.

CRO: All right. Second plane crashed into building, blowing up. This is -- oh, man. Blowing up. Okay.

CRO: Okay. Okay. Warren and Broadway in Manhattan. Okay. There's also a West Broadway, so this is regular Broadway; right?

OPERATOR: I don't know, we're just trying to ascertain. This is Barclay at this time. It's all in that area, all in the same area. We need all the person -- we need all the personnel over there. We've got two planes crashed into the World Trade Center. We're dealing with a terrorist act. So please send all your necessary personnel there, please.

CRO: Right, okay. Our dispatchers are working on that; okay? But I'm just the CRO; all right? You need numerous personnel. Are you injured yourself?

CALLER:

CRO: Oh, okay. Try to calm down; okay?

CALLER:

CRO: You need numerous EMS. You have multiple --

OPERATOR (to second person): She knows. I got it.

CALLER (in background):

CRO: Okay. We have people -- we have a lot of people injured with trauma.

CRO: You said you've got a hundred people where?

CRO: 106th floor. You guys trapped in there?

CALLER:

CRO: You can't get to the stairway. You can't get to the elevators.

CALLER:

CRO: You have a-- Is there a fire going on?

CALLER:

CRO: You see smoke.

CALLER:

CRO: But there's no fire in where you are? Then it should be all right to open the window.

CALLER:

CRO: Okay, you have a hundred--

CALLER (to others at scene):

CRO: Sir, do you have 100 people or 120 people?

CALLER:

CRO: 100 people.

CRO: Okay. Okay.

CALLER:

CRO: This is 911, hon, 911. This is emergency, this is Fire Department.

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. If there's no fire that you can see --

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. Is anybody coughing in there or anything?

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. You should be able to open a window as long as there's no fire going on, because if you have a fire going on and you open a window, you would be feeding the fire.

CALLER:

CRO: As far as we know, the fire is-- we don't -- we haven't had any reports of any fires. But it's just that there are --

CALLER:

CRO: You don't -- You don't understand? You don't know what's going on, what happened? Is that what you're telling me, sir? You don't know what has happened; right?

CRO: Okay.

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. A plane hit the building, and there has been another plane that hit the building. I don't know if it's the same building.

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. Right at this point open the window. If you see a window to open, open the window.

CALLER:

CRO: You know, I'm not there. I can only go by what you're telling me. You only should open a window if -- if there's more smoke outside than there is inside, if you open the window, it's going to bring all the smoke outside in. If there's a fire going on anywhere and you open the window, it's going to make the fire ignite more.

CALLER:

CRO: Yeah, I can hear you. I can hear you.

OPERATOR: RO, I'm disconnecting; okay?

CRO: We are the Fire Department. We have numerous -- we have numerous people all over. I mean, the Fire Department --

CALLER:

CRO: The Fire Department, EMS, is crawling all over the place. They're trying, they're trying to help everybody as much as they can. Okay? Can you hold on for a minute, sir? I just want to talk to the person in charge of the dispatchers. Hold on.

CRO (to lieutenant): Lieutenant, lieutenant --

CALLER (to second person):

CRO: Hello, are you still there, sir? Hello?

CALLER:

CRO: You're the ATB?

CALLER:

CRO: Who am I speaking to?

CALLER:

CRO: Okay. Well, I can't make any calls out from this line. It's just -- oh, God, this is really terrible. Okay. Okay. I got the information. I'm going to try to see what I can do.

CRO: Okay. 120? Okay. That's what I asked him. He said 100. Okay. He had 120 people on the 106th floor. Is that the -- is that One World Trade?

CALLER:

CRO: Is that the first building, because I don't know -- I know there was a second hit. Okay. You know what, can you hold on so I can keep this line open with you? I'm going to try to see if they're working on it; okay?

CALLER:

CRO: Hold on. (Pause.)

CRO: Okay. Okay. He told me I could put a job in; okay? So I'm going to -- I'm just going to dupe the job over to the dispatcher so they can get it; okay?

CALLER:

CRO: And we'll send somebody. They're crawling with all of us down there; okay?

CALLER:

CRO: As long as we let them know and that they wanted some instructions. If they get back in contact with you, just have them call back 911. We'll try to see what we can do; okay?

AC, what ATOM do you have? Is that 001 D or something, because I'm getting something-- it's not West Broadway; right?

OPERATOR: No, again, just Broadway, Broadway and Broome Street.

CRO: So I guess any of these ATOMs, 15 and D, 5 E and 5 F is all the same area or you don't --

OPERATOR: No, I'm not getting that.

CRO: No, what happens is when I put in just Broome Street and Broadway, it comes up with different ATOMs for the police sectors. You just sent me the job?

OPERATOR: Yeah. I've been, but it's -- you got it now?

CRO: Yeah. Wait a minute. It's not -- it's not picking it up, though. Hold on a second. I just lost it. Oh, okay, I've got it. Okay.

CRO: One second, ma'am. We have numerous EMS all over the location over there; okay? So don't worry.

CALLER:

CRO: One second. I'm going to give you the information in one second. Just give me a minute here. It's not taking this. Okay, one minute.

CALLER:

CRO: One second, one second. I have the job. It's just that the computer is doing all kinds of crazy things. We have so many crazy things going on here.

CRO: The last job you gave, I didn't get it. Is it the same location?
